

OPERATIONS


One of the biggest threats to a community is a rapidly evolving incident, such as a wild land fire or house to house burning in an urban setting. If left unchecked, it can expand the community damage and citizen threat. The results from a catastrophic incident can be far-reaching and adversely affect community services, government economic sustainability ,and resident confidence in provided core services. Measuring the number and types of fires quantifies the level of threat or risk assumed by a community.








DISPATCH TIME: FIRE / EMS



CONSEQUENCES BREAKDOWN

Consequence is a measurement of the outcome based on the type of incident. The consequences of an emergency incident result from a combination of the risk level associated with hazards present, the event's duration and nature, and the response interventions. Consequences are divided into three basic categories:


- 1. Life Civilian and firefighter injury or loss of life
- 2. Property Damage or loss
 - a. Infrastructure damage or loss
 - b. Property saved
- 3. Environment Damage or loss







INVESTIGATIONS: 3

January 24th, 260 Merrydale, San Rafael

Description of investigation: Marin County Fire Investigation Team Leader, Ryan Boykin assisted San Rafael Fire with a fire investigation of an apartment on the second floor. The area of origin was determined to be in a children's bedroom next to the night stand. Two possible causes of the fire were located in the area of origin; a portable floor heater and a lamp. The fire was determined to be accidental in nature.

February 10th, Sausalito, Tent City

Description of investigation: Upon the arrival of the Marin County Fire Investigation team, a briefing and walk through occurred at the fire scene. During this time, the possible suspect was questioned by the Sausalito Police Department then taken into custody. Prevention 2 from Southern Marin Fire District interviewed the suspect as well and remained on scene gathering evidence. The cause of the fire is under investigation.


March 3rd, 1530 Armstrong, Novato

Fire Investigator Boykin assisted Marin County Fire Investigation Team Leader, Chief Scott Alber with a mobile home fire investigation in Novato. The origin of the fire was determined to be the bathroom where the deepest burn patterns were present. Multiple possible causes of the fire were located in the area of origin. The cause is unknown at this time, but it was determined to be accidental in nature.

PREVENTION + PUBLIC EDUCATION

LONG RANGE ACOUSTIC DEVICE (LRAD) EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEMS

- L.R.A.D. was presented to the City of Mill Valley Council and the SMFD Board to update the status of installation and expansion efforts.
- SMFD notified 2,300 residents in Tam Valley and Strawberry prior to the first of L.R.A.D. tests in the District on April 1st, 2022. Monthly testing will continue on the first Saturday at 12 noon at both Stations 4 and 9.
- MWPA CORE project proposals, for FY 22/23, were submitted to include additional L.R.A.D. sites in and around the District.
- The "Did You Hear It?" (DYHI) campaign received 98
 responses from the public since launched. This DYHI data will
 continue to help the efforts for future site selections.




IMPLEMENTATION OF ONLINE INSPECTION SCHEDULING SYSTEM



- The ability to allow residents, contractors, and business professionals access to the District Prevention staff has provided enhanced public access while decreasing dedicated District staff assigned to scheduling.
- The platform has partially eliminated the need to issue invoices for services rendered by District staff, as the process allows for a pay to schedule feature.
